Cross-country Ski Trail Etiquette

Single Track

- When two skiers meet head-on on a hill (even a gentle one), the skier going uphill should yield the right of way to the downhill skier.
- When a faster skier catches up to a slower skier going the same direction, the slower skier should yield the right of way.

Double Track

- Keep right except to pass.
- If you are using the left track to pass, to talk to a friend, or because it is a better track, yield it to oncoming skiers.

Anywhere

- Never stop in the track. If you have to stop for more than 10 seconds for any reason, step to the side and leave enough room for someone to ski past in the track.
- It is considered good manners to greet other skiers.
- If you feel the "call of nature" go well off the trail, even if no one is watching.
- If a skier calls "Track Please!!", he or she is asking you to yield the right of way. Please do so.
- Be polite. If someone yields the right of way for you, thank them.
- If you need to walk down a hill, please avoid walking in the ski track.
- Herringbone uphill to one side of the set track.

Yielding the Right of Way

 Yielding the right of way means quickly getting out of the track to ensure there is enough room for the other skier to ski past in the track.

Snowshoeing

• Please snowshoe to one side of the set ski track and avoid damaging the track.

Snowmobiling

 Avoid travelling over a track-set ski trail. Please travel to one side or in the middle of set tracks and avoid damaging the ski track.

Dogs

 Dogs on cross country set tracks is not nice for other skiers, but if you must, please clean up after your pet!"
